COLLABORATION: THE SECRET TO SOLVING THE PUZZLE OF PEDIATRIC BRAIN CANCER

Experts agree that the key to finding the cure begins with solving the toughest cancer puzzle; pediatric brain cancers like diffuse intrinsic pontine glioma (DIPG) and diffuse midline glioma (DMG). The Cure Starts Now Foundation believes we cannot solve this puzzle alone. It will take inspiration,

innovation, and, most importantly,

collaboration.

On May 19-20, 2023, The Cure Starts Now hosted its 7th international DIPG/DMG and Medulloblastoma Symposium in Lexington, KY. This summit hosted the world's largest international collective of DIPG/ DMG and Medulloblastoma doctors, researchers, and foundations From left to right, Dr. Ira Dunkel (Memorial Sloan Kettering), from 7 countries with the goal of Dr. Roger Packer (Director, Brain Tumor Institute of Children's National Hospital), Dr. David Ziegler (Sydney Children's Hospital) collaboration through networking and learning from others' research

and experience. Every aspect of the three-day event encourages networking and collaboration while presenting new research.

The fact is, the vast majority of federal funding is not allocated toward today's ground-breaking research, but instead toward implementing trials funded from years ago. Researchers lean on foundations, like The Cure Starts Now, to fund exploratory research that could lead to a cure. This research is crucial to create the next set of clinical trials.

The symposium brought together researchers with pre-secured funding from family foundations as recommended by the Medical Advisory Council. This proactive approach leads to the goal of promoting research and directly benefits next-step research planning before waiting for conclusions to be published. This funding has ensured the success of many breakthrough trials we see today and makes room for collaborations that ensure future success.

On the second afternoon of the event, researchers were granted 4 minutes to pitch their research. That evening, only two researchers would be chosen for a \$50,000 Cure Fund Grant. In the end, the Medical Advisory Council chose Dr. Biplab Dasgupta of Cincinnati

> Children's for "Exploring Novel Targets on DIPG" and Dr. Maria Wiese and Dr. Christof Kramm of the University Medical Center Goettingen for "Starve the Monster: Multi-Metabolic Treatment Strategies for H3.3K27M-Mutant DIPG/DMG".

This event brings together family foundations who work tirelessly to raise money for better research and treatment; researchers who desperately want to see their out-of-the-box ideas come to fruition; and doctors who bear witness to the disease as they treat patients in hospitals.

In this collision of worlds, innovation is born. Together, we hope to solve this complicated puzzle that has been underfunded and under-researched, in hopes that one day we can save the next child who receives a brain cancer diagnosis.

CONNOR'S "CURE"SADE AGAINST CANCER



Connor George is a spunky little boy who sees magic in every part of his life. He looks at the world with absolute joy and an open heart. Much of Connor's young life was spent in the hospital when he was diagnosed with medulloblastoma. After his diagnosis, his mother Brooke began researching for information, education, and organizations that specialized in pediatric brain cancer leading her to discover The Cure Starts Now. After months of research, Brooke determined The Cure Starts Now's mission was the revolutionary pathway to funding pediatric brain cancer research.

Medulloblastoma is a fast-growing primary central nervous system tumor. It usually appears as a solid mass in the cerebellum. As a common malignant brain tumor predominantly found in children under the age of ten, aggressive subgroups of medulloblastoma can be resistant to treatment, fitting the criteria for Homerun applications. "While medulloblastoma has a better prognosis than DIPG/DMG, survival does not come without challenges," Brooke stated. Thanks to

recent research, DIPG and medulloblastoma have greater similarities than previously believed.

Connor received his diagnosis when he was two years old. Within one month, he underwent seven surgeries before he was able to begin his required treatment. Once cleared, he began an eight-month journey with chemotherapy. Connor relapsed three short months after completing treatment, requiring additional surgeries and six weeks of proton radiation. Despite spending most of his childhood in the hospital, Connor never complained.

Separation from his siblings during treatment took a toll on Connor, though they tried to visit when able. On a trip to the zoo with his mom, Connor picked out stuffed animals for himself and his siblings who were back home, out of state. Brooke said she would buy a toy just for him. He quickly

returned the toy to the shelf and replied, "I don't want to get anything if no one else does." Connor's big heart and capacity for kindness continue to teach his family the value of time and the power of love.

Brooke's priorities began to change after Connor's first completed treatment. A passion began to take hold of her heart to advocate for childhood cancer awareness. She reached out to The Cure Starts Now and asked to start the first North Dakota Chapter, Connor's CUREsaders.

Anxiety builds every four months as they prepare for his scans, and they hope the cancer remains at bay. They are committed to advocating for childhood brain cancer and funding essential research until the cure is discovered.
